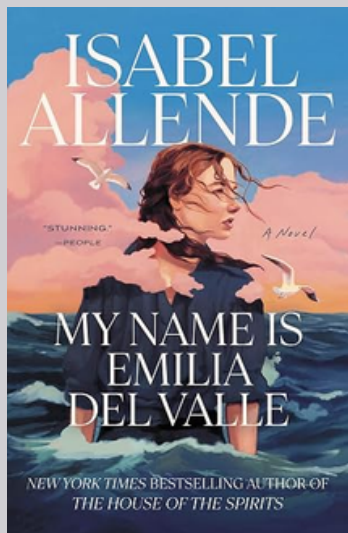

This month, The Interchurch Center spotlights Church World Service (CWS), a faith-based global humanitarian organization that has spent 80 years transforming communities through just and sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, displacement, and disaster. Founded by a coalition of Christian denominations, CWS works across the United States and around the world toward a vision where everyone has food, a voice, and a safe place to call home.

About Church World Service

At the heart of CWS is a commitment to welcoming the stranger and walking alongside communities as they build lasting solutions to some of the world's most urgent challenges. CWS prioritizes strong local partnerships, recognizing that sustainable change is most effective when communities are empowered to lead. Its work is guided by the values of justice, hope, belonging, collaboration, and integrity.

Their work includes:

- Displacement & Refugee Resettlement: Helping refugees and newcomers rebuild their lives through resettlement services, legal assistance, and community integration.
- Hunger & Poverty: Partnering with communities to create locally rooted solutions to malnutrition, poverty, and economic hardship
- Disaster Relief & Recovery: Supporting communities before, during, and long after disasters through preparedness, emergency response, and long-term recovery.

For eight decades, CWS has remained committed to meeting evolving needs while serving communities with dignity, compassion, and hope.

Spotlight on Richard (Rick) Santos

Rick Santos has served as President and CEO of Church World Service since 2021, bringing more than 30 years of experience with faith-based and humanitarian organizations. Prior to joining CWS, he served as President and CEO of IMA World Health and spent a decade in Asia working alongside local organizations and communities.

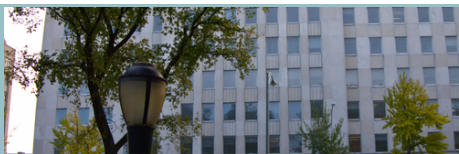

MISSION MASTERY

TIPS & TRICKS FOR NON-PROFITS

YOUR IMPACT STORY SHOULD BE EASY TO TELL

Your nonprofit may be doing incredible work, but can your staff, board members, and volunteers explain that impact in 30 seconds? A clear, consistent message helps people understand your mission, and makes it easier for them to share it with others.

Instead of only describing what you do, connect your work to who it helps and what changes because of it.

Strengthen your impact story:

- Start with the need your organization addresses
- Explain your mission in one clear sentence
- Use one strong statistic to demonstrate your reach
- Share a brief story that puts a person behind the numbers
- Give staff and board members simple language they can confidently use
- End with a clear way for others to get involved

When everyone can communicate your mission clearly, every conversation becomes an opportunity to build awareness, strengthen relationships, and inspire support.

Clarity turns your mission into a message people can remember, and share.
